



Alphabet Matching

Here is an engaging matching activity that supports your child's gross motor, cognitive, and language development while learning the letters of the alphabet.

Let's Explore

Things to Gather:

- Paper Squares
- Tape
- Marker or pencil

Things Provided:

Let's Play!

1. Write two sets of alphabet letter (individually) on separate paper. You may start with only half of the alphabets depending on your child's age.
2. Once you have each set of letters, go around the room and tape one set of each letter all around; furniture, walls, floor ext.
3. Give your child the other set. Ask your child to go around the room and find the letters that matches the ones in his/her hand. Ask questions. What is this letter? What is the sound? Can you tell me a word that starts with this letter?
4. When your child collects all the letters. Assist your child with arranging each set in alphabetical order. You can use the wall, the floor or a board as your work area.
5. While you do this, you can sing or play an alphabet song.

Learning on the Go!

ABC Search

- Collect magazines, newspapers, cereal boxes, milk/juice carton boxes with big letters. Give your child a marker or crayon and ask him/her to find and circle the alphabet letters. Ask questions. What letters did you find? What is the name of the letters? What sounds do the letters make?

My ABC container

- Find a container or bucket in your house. Have the alphabet letters written on pieces of paper or cardboard. Ask your child to pull out letters (one at a time) from the container and ask him/her to name the letter. As he/she pulls them out, ask him to name and share the sound they make. Each missed letter goes back to the container after you review the letter with your child. Ask questions. Can you think of a word that starts with this letter?
