Children take notice in everything around them. They most often can tell differences between others in our communities by sharing conversations with them. However, we can teach them to appreciate differences in others.

Invite your child to a conversation with you. Together, think of something you like doing that makes you unique. This can be making a family recipe, wear clothes that highlight culture, engage in special dances and so forth. Consider sharing your special thing with someone else through a short letter or note. If words get too long, take pictures instead or have your child draw it out, with a note that says “This is what makes me and my family unique, how about you?” Mail it off!

Talking about what makes us unique offers windows of teachable moments with your children. It can assist them in understanding that we are not all the same but that is okay because we can learn from one another. It also encourages children to immerse themselves in other cultures and find a multitude of ways to socialize with others.
